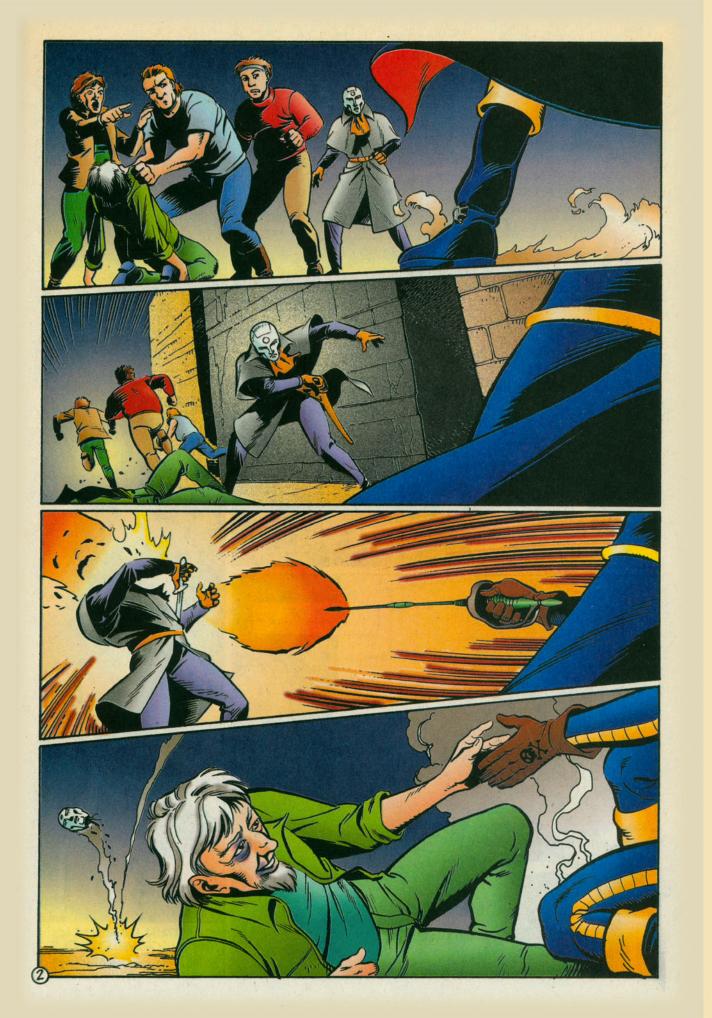

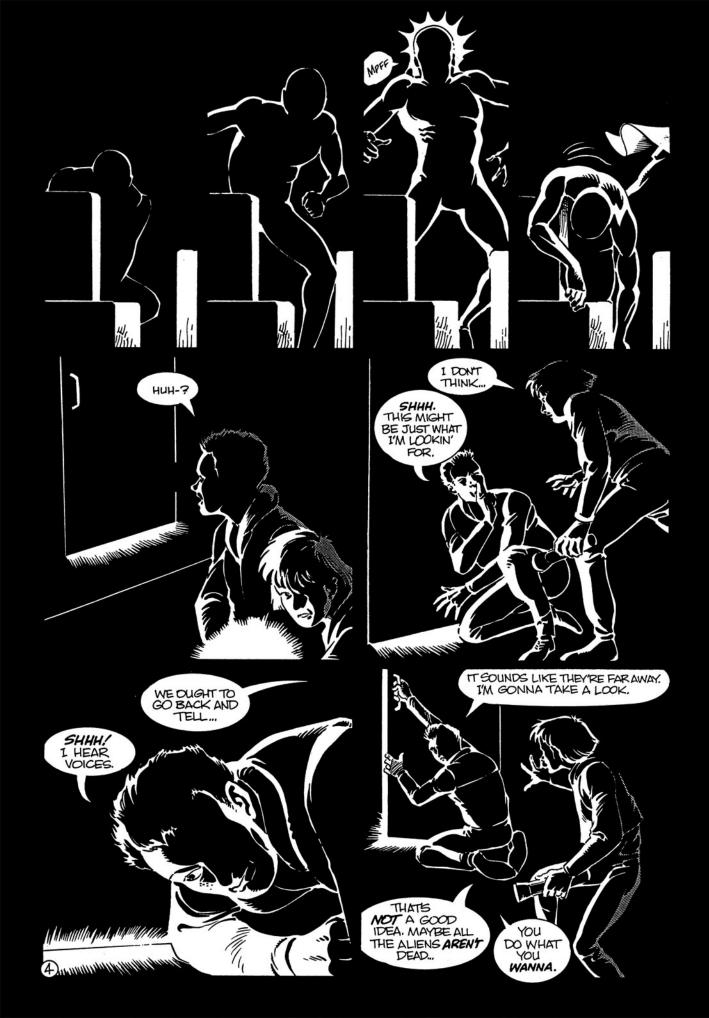

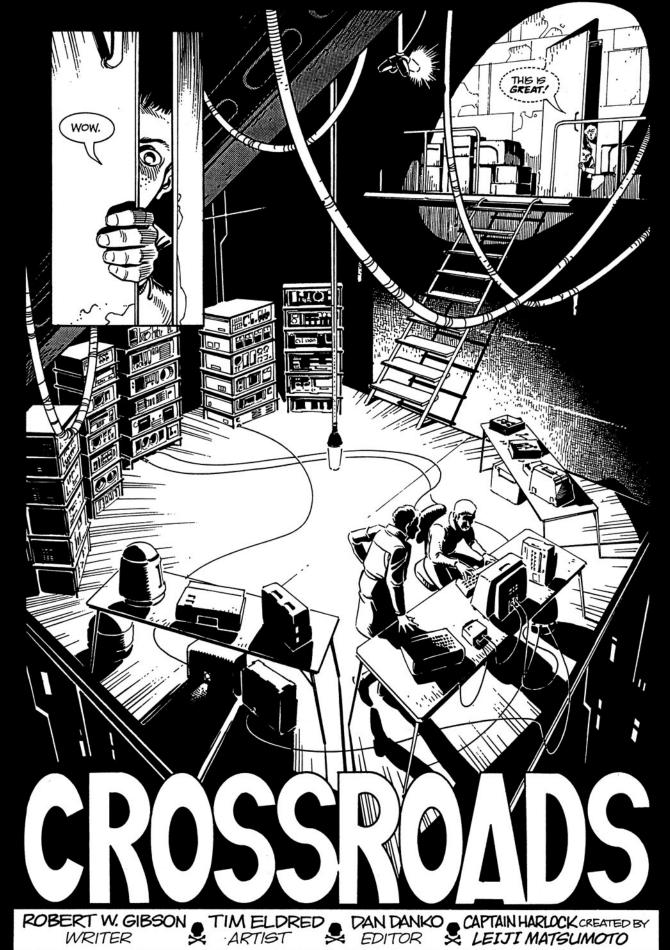

Been a long time, eh?

This is the first text piece in a CAPTAIN HARLOCK issue since the first issue of the DEATHSHADOW RISING mini-series over two years ago. A lot has happened since then, so Tim Eldred and I decided we owed it to the readers who have stuck with us for the past five years (as well as those of you hopped aboard somewhere along the way) to update things a bit.

Foremost among recent developments, Tim has relocated to California and taken a position on the art staff at Malibu Graphics (publisher of the Eternity Comics line). In fact, he IS the art staff at Malibu Graphics. Between fixing art, lettering, designing logos and generally spilling ink all over the offices, he's still drawing CAPTAIN HARLOCK and his own ARMORED ROAD POLICE strip for the new ETERNITY TRIPLE ACTION. He keeps all four arms busy, believe me.

And with the upcoming ULTRAlith that is the Malibu ULTRAVERSE (the first issues of which will be arriving this June to a comic shop near you), our illustrious editor and man-of-too-many-duties, Dan Danko, has been summoned hither and yon by the powers that be, so that he can peer over Chris Ulm's shoulders on the ULTRAVERSE books. Which means that we here at Eternity have a new editor and soon to be man-of-many-duties.

Our new masochist...er, editor is Hank Kanalz, currently the writer on Malibu's EX-MUTANTS title. Since I've never actually MET Hank, I guess I shouldn't say anything nasty about him. And he DID find us room for the page you're now reading. Which makes him a nice guy. I take back the masochist reference. At least until he starts pulling his hair out.

As longtime readers will notice, we started a new plotline with the FALL OF THE EMPIRE series. Getting rid of the Illumidas was something that had to happen in order so that we could move along the bumpy timeline that Mr. Matsumoto has established in his var-

ious Harlock projects. The plan from the very first issue of our version of CAPTAIN HARLOCK was to tell original stories which were pretty consistent with established continuity per the original SPACE PIRATE CAPTAIN HARLOCK and MY YOUTH IN ARCADIA projects. As fans know, the events in SPACE PIRATE take place a good time after the events in MYIA. Getting from one point to the other was our plan. This mini-series marks the middle of that journey.

Whether that journey continues on this side of the Pacific is dependent on several things. Some, we have control over; others we don't. If you like what we're doing, please write the folks at Eternity and let them know. Letters are particularly needed. We've received marvelous words of praise and encouragement from just about everyone who I have sent sample issues to, but, due primarily to current market conditions, that positive feedback has not resulted in increased sales. We're in the same boat as many non-superhero titles not published by the Big Two. Customers don't tell retailers that the WILL buy the books, therefore the retailers don't order any more than the bare minimum. So when a potential new reader enters the shops, there are precious few non-super-hero books for them to sample. It's no one's fault. It's just the nature of the market at present. But that doesn't mean it has to be this way forever.

So, by all means, if you find a book that you really like, be it space-opera, super-hero, horror or whatever, be sure to inform your retailer that you WILL buy it if they order it. Tell your friends about it. Have your friends tell the retailer that THEY will buy it if he/she orders more. It's got to start from the ground up!

Like Harlock and his crew, maybe a few people CAN make a difference...
