Please don't ask us for advanced copies of material that is scheduled to appear in a future issue. If we did that, no one would want to buy that issue!



### Westchester Woes

What's happening with Star Blazers 3?

Is the third series of *Star Blazers* dead...?! Westchester Films, the company who has the syndication rights to *Star Blazers* and who has been advertising having a third series available for syndication to stations for more than a year now, apparently will not be translating the *Yamato III* series into English after all. There is no official word from Westchester on the subject, although they've reportedly been making comments about a lack of funds. Michael Pinto had reported in the *Star Blazers Fandom Report* that Westchester had promised an entire line of *Star Blazers* merchandising; none of this has come about. The third series had reportedly been targeted for delivery to stations at the end of October, 1982; this was pushed back to December, 1982; and now, the project is apparently in limbo. In a discussion Pinto had with Claude S. Hill, the president of Westchester, Hill seemed to be excited about the series, and in fact had episodes of the Japanese *Yamato III* on videotape. Hope had been high among fans at the news, but now we can't help but be impatient at the constant delays... or a least, if Westchester can't help the delays, the lack of information on the status of the third series of *Star Blazers*.

A copy of this premiere issue of Space Fanzine Yamato will be sent to Mr. Hill, and this is an open invitation for him or any other representatives of Westchester Films to contact us and clear the air about this subject of great importance to Star Blazers fans, either by way of an interview, a letter for publication, or any way most convenient to him.



# There's a time for everything

### A General Timeline for the Yamato Saga

The exact time that the Gamilas/Gamilons first attacked Earth isn't known exactly - and it doesn't help much that, even in the usually-reliable Japanese books, vague and conflicting dates are given.

In Reiji Matsumoto's original comic book story of Space Battleship Yamato (title listed on the reprint's cover in a mangled-English translation, Cosmoship Yamato), it's written that aggression from space began at the beginning of the 21st century, and increased as time went on. Matsumoto gives the impression that when the story opens in the year 2199, the Gamilons have been at it quite a while, and are simply mopping up the few human survivors left after decades of fighting.

But in Yoshinobu Nishizaki's novel Space Battleship Yamato, the Earth is supposed to have been first hit by planet bombs in 2192, with Japan (a.k.a. Great Island) getting clobbered for the first time on April 10, 2192. During the summer of 2193 Japan began to build Earth's sole underground city, and it was also during this summer that a planet bomb hit Japan's Miura Penninsula, crashing down right on top of Kodai/Wildstar's parents.

And to further confuse things, in Star Blazers the Gamilons are said to have been doing nasty things "since the mid-21st century"...So, the exact date the Gamilons first began to pick on Earth is wide open for speculation. From 2199 on, though, dates are given for nearly everything that happens. Here's a general timeline for the events of the saga:


Be Forever Yamato Movie, 1980 2202

Earth occupied by Dark Nebula Empire forces; Alex Wildstar dies; Yamato goes to the Dark Nebula Empire's mother planet and wins the decisive battle, but at the cost of Sasha's life; Yamato returns to Earth.

Space Battleship Yamato III Third T.V. series, 1980 - 81 Supposed Star Blazers third series 2205

Garuman - Gamilon war with Bolar Commonwealth; our Sun enlarged by a Garuman - Gamilon proton missile and threatens to fry Earth; Yamato leaves Earth to find a new planet for man to live on; planet Shalbert gives Yamato the Hydro Cosmogen to restore the sun; the Garuman - Gamilons defeat the Bolar; Yamato shoots the antidote into the sun in time, and returns to Earth.

This timeline follows the main line of continuity in the Yamato universe. There are two others, both of which are supposed to be alternate endings to the story, and will be discussed in future issues. One involves the movie *Arrivederchi Yamato*, which takes place in 2201 and ends with Kodai/Wildstar and Yamato suiciding - but gaining eternal life together with the rest of the crew - in a crash that destroys the Comet Empire and saves Earth. The other saga finale, also a sequel to the first series as *Arrivederchi* was, is the movie *Space Battleship Yamato - The Concluding Chapter* (a.k.a. *Final Yamato*) and will be released in Japan on March 12, 1983. It (the story) takes place over the duration of a mere 16 days. A bit confusing? We'll straighten everything out in the next issue!

# Final Yamato Update

Before Yamato there was Yamato, and after Yamato there will be Yamato. With those words, published just over a year ago, producer Yoshinobu Nishizaki threw Yamato fandom on both sides of the ocean into instant consternation. Before, there had been all kinds of warped speculation on a proposed *Final Yamato* movie, but The Man with the Yen for Yen's cryptic hint added fuel to the fire. In the months since, bits and pieces of information have been tossed out for fans to gnaw on, never enough to piece together the entire story, but always enough to keep 'em slobbering for more. Now, with the March 12 premiere date less than 2 months away, we can put the odd and sundry story fragments, production paintings, suspicious stills, and traces of character trivia together, sprinkle it with the still-unanswered hints and riddles, and Voila! We get a sketchy framework of the first half or so of the story...a rather hollow victory, though, since Nishizaki says Captain Avatar will be revived and Derek Wildstar might die, and he won't say *how!* 

And that's not the only mystery - the Final Yamato movie is supposed to be a sequel to the first series! This splits the saga's continuity three different ways: Yamato 1 - Arrivederchi Yamato, Yamato 1 - Yamato 2 - Yamato-New Journey - Be Forever Yamato - Yamato III, and now Yamato 1 - Final Yamato!

There are contradictions galore to this - during the course of what's known about the movie, the Cosmo Hound shows up, and Wildstar seems to know all about Desslok's new mechanical Garuman-Gamilon planet and war with Bolar Commonwealth, all of which took place in Yamato III, two years after the Final Yamato movie is supposed to happen. The movie does hearken back to the first series in characters (hot dawg - Jordie Venture!), mechanical design (it's nice to see the Cosmo Zero back in action), and general tone.

But enough babbling - here's what been patched together of the story:

Four billion years ago, when Earth was born, a huge planet of water called Aquarius passed by it. The interference of Aquarius' gravity dumped huge amounts of water on Earth, beginning life on the planet in the oceans that were formed. The next time Aquarius passed Earth was in the Paleozoic Era, but this time the results were different - excess water was removed, and the dinosaurs died off.

Aquarius itself has a core of heavy water, and its' surface is entirely water. Floating continents hover over the sea, and long ago a civilization inhabited them. But now, the Queen of Aquarius lives alone in th ruins.

In the year 2203 Aquarius' orbit is bringing it toward Earth once again. But its' velocity makes a nebula that it passes undergo a dimension dislocation, and that nebula ends up overlapping our galaxy. Stars collide, spouting hydrogen gas, infrared and X-rays. The Earth Defense Force sends the Yamato, under Captain Derek Wildstar, to investigate the commotion.

Yamato manages to reach the overlapped galaxy, where they come upon...Desslok's mechanical Garuman-Gamilon planet! But Desslok's palace has been destroyed, and not much else on the planet is left in one piece in the wake of whatever catastrophe hit them. Assuming Desslok is dead, Wildstar pays his last respects...and a planet careens into the mechanical Garuman-Gamilon. Yamato can't outrun the ensuing blast of the planet's death throes, and is forced to free-warp, with no calculations...

At warp's end, a very lost Yamato arrives just in time to see Aquarius drown the entire planet of Deingil. Ever noble, Wildstar dispatches the Cosmo Hound shuttle to save as many people as possible. Only a few can be pulled from the water, and of those, only one small boy can be taken aboard Yamato before the Hound succumbs to the water force and falls down into the flood on Deingil, sinking.

With nothing else he can do to help the doomed people, Wildstar wires the Earth Defense Force to warn them of Planet Aquarius, and Yamato leaves to try and find the way home. Suddenly, a vast fleet confronts the ship, taking it for an enemy. Lugar II, the commander who also just happens to be the son of Deingil's leader Lugar, attacks Yamato with radioactive missiles that slice right through her armor, and slowly spread radioactive rays throughut the ship. The crew is brought down one by one, falling into syncopic states. Sandor realizes what's happening and has everyone put on their spacesuits...but when rays finally reach the main bridge, Wildstar is the only one who doesn't have his helmet on in time.

Yamato plummets, helpless, and Lugar II lets her go. But as it crashes down onto a planet, the third bridge hits a mountaintop, and the jolt jars an automatic-operation defense system into operation. And it guides Yamato safely back to Earth.

Yamato lands, and Dr. Sane and Nova, who've been on Earth all the while, rush on board. Dr. Sane assures Nova that everyone who wore spacesuits would recover, but then Nova finds the helmet-less Derek, and breaks down. She kneels down beside him, takes his Cosmo Gun, and aims it at her throat...

So much for the story scraps...although it's probably wise to mention that Wildstar is hovering between life and death in a much later scene, having fun nightmares about nasty things being done to him. Now it's time to type a bit on characters...

The rough part of what's been revealed about characters is, it's nigh onto impossible to fit any of it in with what little of the story has been revealed! Captain Avatar is back, Nishizaki announced last July, or at least, he's been revived. Nishizaki also says that yes, he did die at the end of the first series. And the only reason that's turned up for Avatar's turning-up is that he must be the captain of the Yamato.

One of the big themes that will be in the movie is the father-son relationships between Avatar and Wildstar, and Lugar and Lugar II. Families of crew members will reportedly be seen, and the relationship between brothers Mark and Jordie Venture will be explored. And the Queen of Aquarius is out there too, with her face superimposed all over things in publicity art (sound familiar?!)...

This Final Yamato movie - officially titled Space Battleship Yamato - The Concluding Chapter but being billed in English as Final Yamato just the same - is meant to be the great commemoration of the Yamato saga's decade of existence, dating back to the first series' debut in 1974. Months before the movie has even hit the screen, a Yamato - Prologue to the Final music and narration album has been released by Nippon Columbia, and other books and records are all being aimed for late February and early March release...not to mention the flood of merchandizing and other fun stuff that will come out after the 70mm movie premieres. Whether it spawns a Final Yamato T.V. series remains to be seen.

Three months from now we'll be kicking ourselves for not being able to figure out the whole story, after we find out the whole plot and see how all of the smug little hints fit together. But for now, we'll just have to fret over the puzzle, and get ready for the return of Avatar.

### Sounds of Yamato

Being a checklist and translations of the Music and Drama Records from Space Cruiser Yamato

Finding the records from *Space Cruiser Yamato* isn't as hard as some people would have you believe. The first thing to know is how much you can expect to pay. You should *never*, *ever* pay more than a penny per yen for a record. In other words, a 2500 yen record wouldn't cost more than \$25.00, and you don't even have to pay *that* much.

There are two companies that I have done business with, both are good and have their own plusses and minuses.

Sound Track Album Retailers (S.T.A.R.) P.O. Box 7, Quarryville, PA. 17566

Good points: Low prices on double record sets (most drama LPs) usually \$24.95 (as of 1/83). Good service, friendly personnel, will accept phone orders, credit cards welcome. Nippon Columbia records are unaltered, with paper banners intact. Fast shipping by Airmail if requested and paid for. Will accept special orders, paid in advance.

Bad points: Single LPs are relatively expensive. (\$19.95) Records are sent U.S. Mail, never UPS (why?) - postage can kill you if don't order several records, but the surface rate has dropped. An example - a friend of mine ordered the "Complete Collection Yamato" from them, and paid almost \$30.00 to have it Airmail shipped - it showed up two weeks later, surface mail, with only \$10 postage on it, S.T.A.R. got almost \$20.00 extra for the set. Other bad points - small catalog of titles, never any records ordered in quantity to cover demand, so a lot of people are always waiting for at least one record. Not much knowledge of records, you must know exactly what you want.

Over all review: Good people, but not prepared for the flood of orders sure to follow this issue - be prepared to wait at least two months for any Yamato record that you order.

Melody Records 16127 So. Western Ave. Gardena, CA. 90247

Good points: Good prices on single LPs (usually \$13.98 as of 1/83), postage per weight and sent UPS, most soundtracks are always in stock and ready to ship. Also have cassette tapes and .45s, but you have to ask about them. Very nice people to deal with, and very eager to help you find a record.

Bad points: All Nippon Columbia records have their paper banners removed and big ugly black DENON stickers pasted over everything. Double record sets are very expensive - double the cost of a single. Also you must be very precise when merely asking about a record, otherwise they'll send it to you and you'll have to pay for a record you may not want. Another friend asked about a lot of records, but forgot to clearly state that they only wanted to know if Melody had them in stock and that this was not an order. Surprise! Over \$200.00 worth of records showed up - C.O.D.! You must clearly state and seperate a record order from a request for information!! Also Melody doesn't normally carry drama records, so they almost always have to be special ordered, which takes anywhere from 2-6 months.


Overall review: Good prices on single LPs, if you don't mind the DENON stickers, but S.T.A.R. is cheaper for multiple record sets (except for Complete Collection Yamato, which is an incredibly low \$116.74 as of 1/83). Melody can also find strange Yamato records - Yamato - I Adore The Eternity Of Love and Yamato Main Theme BGM (Flexi Disc) are both readily available from them.

As I said earlier, I have dealt with both companies and feel they both give honest service. But now I need the help of you, the reader. Write to me, in care of the fanzine, and tell me of your experience in finding these records. Let met know where and who you got the record from, the cost, postage, length of delivery time, and if it was Nippon Columbia or DENON. If you ordered from S.T.A.R. or Melody, please let me know of any problems.

Also, If you are a dealer, and you can meet or beat these prices and services, we would be happy to tell people about you. But be warned, if your prices are outrageously high, we'll tell people about that too!

So now the ball is in your court. Give these people your business and please tell 'em we sent you.







## Who's Who


The First Season and its "good guys"

Captain Jyūzo Okita/Captain Avatar: Age 52. Admiral of the Combined Earth Defense Fleet, he lost not only the last few fragments of the fleet, but also his only son, in the battle against the Gamilas/Gamilons near Pluto. Under his captaincy, Flagship No. 225 was the only ship to return to Earth. A veteran of many battles, and a brilliant physicist to boot, he became captain of the Yamato/Argo even though he was dying of radiation sickness.

Susumu Kodai/Derek Wildstar: Age 18. The leader of Yamato's Combat Group, he also commands the Black Tiger fighter planes, and is named Deputy Captain when Okita/Avatar becomes to weak to carry full command of the ship. Orphaned at age 11 when a falling Planet Bomb crushed his parents Takeo and Akiko (no names given in Star Blazers), he later lost his only brother in the Battle of Pluto.





Hikozaemon Tokugawa/Orion: Age 57. A veteran and old associate of Okita/Avatar, he is Chief Engineer and leader of the Engine Group on board the Yamato.

Kenjirō Ōta/Eager: In charge of the main bridge's video panel and an expert in navigation, he's second to Shima/Venture in the Navigation Group.







Yasuo Nambu/Dash: Second to Kodai/Wildstar in the Combat Group, his duties are in gunnery assistance, and during battles his post is in the Number One Main Gun Turret.

Akira Yamamoto/Hardy: A Black Tiger pilot, he was almost left behind when Yamato made her first space warp. He's just behind Kato/Conroy in both flying skill and the Black Tiger's chain of command.

Analyzer/IQ-9: A robot whose model is long-outdated, he claims to be a genius and has an uneraseable crush on Yuki/Nova. When he's not getting drenched in sake or hitching up Yuki/Nova's skirt, he serves as navigational assistance, helps out Dr. Sado/Sane, and goes about his main duties of investigation and analysis.

He appears in episode 15, where he makes some rude comments (as does everyone else) about Yuki/Nova's coffee. He is never seen again...

Communications Person: Another crewman from episode 19. This is one of the few people we see who wears a black-on-white uniform. One reason for this is that, being Wave Motion radio was a new concept, he was a physicist keeping an eye on the radio's behavior. On the other hand, it may have been a mistake...

Miscellaneous Computer Guys: O.K. Granted things seem to be getting carried away, but we want to give you a complete list here. These guys are checking out all the stuff brought back from Ballan in episode 21.

Sado/Sane's Nurse: Seen only in episode 12, this nurse is noteworthy only because of her help in getting Okita/Avatar a spacesuit, and her unique physical traits.

Medical Assistant: This guy helps Sado/Sane examine Aihara/Homer in episode 19, so we thought we'd mention him.





## Clothes Make the Man

### The Star Force Uniform and the Understanding Thereof

Everyone recognizes the Star Force uniform pictured on the opposite page, but not all of you may understand all of the color combinations and other little things about it. This is a short article that will attempt to remedy this situation.

To start off, for all of you who sew (or you uniform hopefuls), here's the semi-official hints about this uniform. Everything in the picture is proportioned correctly - no animator goofs here! The colored area of the sleeves are double-pointed, on either side of the arm. The area of the pantleg, however, starts low in front and raises to a point at the back of the leg. The shoes are white, with the sole the same color as the arrow (the exception being Black Tiger pilots who sometimes can be seen wearing brown shoes). As far as we can tell, the shirt is a pull-over, although, this makes one wonder what the collar is made of. And now, here's the official translation of what these colors stand for...

White/Red - Combat Group; includes Gunnery, Commandoes and (occasionally) Fighter Pilots White/Green - Navigation Group; includes Navigation and Radar

White/Blue - Engineering Group; This consists of Mechanical Engineers, not Engine Room personnel White/Orange - Engine Group; Here's where the Engine Room guys fit in

Yellow/Black - Living Group and Communications Group; These people take care of living arrangements or communications

Black/Yellow - Black Tigers

Lt. Blue/White - Kitchen Group 6

White/Black - Communications and possibly Physics 6


White/Yellow - Unknown, possibly Black Tiger support personnel


Blue/Blue-Gray - Torpedo Boat Pilots 7

- 6 These eventually disappear and meld into the Yellow/Black Living Group and/or Communications Group
  - <sup>7</sup> These show up in Yamato III.

We will go into greater detail about these groups in another issue. Before I finish, I'd like to talk about the collar of the uniform. In all Yamato shows up to Yamato III, the collar is the color of the arrow *only* for group leaders, the rest of the crew have white collars. In Yamato III, *everyone* has a colored collar, but the new crew members also have a white slash mark at the front of the collar. The Star Force belt buckle is not available from anyone at this time, but we're working on this project ourselves and will let you know when they're ready. Also, we have a pretty good Cosmo Gun (Astro Automatic) in the works and we'll let you in on that as well.

In our next issue, we hope to talk about the othe major types of uniforms seen in the first season, including the Gamilon uniforms, and the standard (early) Earth uniforms.





## Don't Bandai This About...

### A Talk on Yamato Models


If you're like most Yamato fans - model builders, you probably wonder to yourself; "Why aren't there any kits from the Yamato series floating around out there?" Well, they're out there, you just have to search. What I shall attempt to do in this article, is to fill you in on just what's available, and where. So, here we go...

Sometime in the late 1970's, a Japanese company named Bandai started producing kits form the Space Cruiser Yamato series. The line kept growing and growing and, at present, there are fifty-six kits available, with more sure to come after the release of the new movie. These kits are in three distinct types: 1) The 100 yen, 5 inch mechanic scale collection, 2) The 500-700 yen group of kits and 3) All the rest.

The mechanic scale kits (at least the ones I have seen) are generally quite nice. The detailing is some of the best I've seen in a kit of this size and the parts usually fit together pretty well. Granted, there are a few bad kits; M-03, the E.D.F. Battleship, for example, is next to hopeless. All in all, however, these kits are worth the money, they have a good fit, great detail and, with a little time, give wonderful results. The third group consists of the oddball sizes. These are ships that were popular enough to warrant the production of larger kits. These are also pretty good, although the fit sometimes leaves a bit to be desired. This entire line of kits has one major problem - out of the entire fifty-six, only a handful are in scale to one another.

Now I suppose you might be curious about kits of the Yamato itself. Well, as you can see from the model list, (a page or so farther) there are six different versions of the Yamato produced. The first is a mechanic scale version. This is a fairly nice kit but it has a few problems. The upper deck has a poor fit with the hull, and some of the guns look a bit silly. It also has the same problem that *all* of the Yamatos have - the wings. Bandai thought it would be a neat idea if all the Yamatos had slots in the hull to stick the wings in. That's fine - if you like wings. If not, be prepared for some putty and sand work. The next nifty thing Bandai did to their Yamatos (and many other kits as well) was to pre-paint certain parts for you. This, of course, can cause problems for the finished product. Anyway, back to the Yamatos.

The next size (10 inch - 700 yen) was probably the first that Bandai produced. It seems to have been based on the version of the ship that Reiji Matsumoto drew in his original comic strip. The "decorative bit" on the front of the ship is several times its normal size and there are a few other changes as well. To my knowledge, this kit was released three different times. The first (which may have been a preassembled toy) was lighted to some degree and probably the market test. The second release, out of *Arrivederchi Yamato's* merchandise flood, had standing backdrop to attach the ship to. The third is a no-frills version. All three came with tacky 1 inch kits of IQ-9, the Cosmo Zero and the Type 100 recon plane.

The third Yamato (1500 yen) is probably the best there is. This 15 inch kit is a near-faithful representation of the Yamato. It goes together farily well, but the pulse lasers are fragile. This kit also happens to be a cheaper way of selling the next Yamato. This kit (2000 yen) is a cutaway model. Using the same exterior as the 1500 yen kit, the left half of the hull neatly pulls away to reveal all the inner secrets of the ship.

The fifth version (3000 yen) is one of the most interesting kits I have ever seen. This is the dreaded "Image Model", a forced perspective kit that, in its 16 inch length, ranges from a height of 5 inches in the front, down to 1 inch in back (not including fins). The biggest problem with *this* kit, as well as the next, is that the connecting dorsal between the hull and the third bridge is an I-beam, hollowed out piece. It will require a large amount of filler and a lot of sanding to achieve the proper shape.

The sixth and Final Yamato (sorry, couldn't resist) is a 22 inch monster. This 3800 yen kit has eluded me thus far, but I have seen enough pictures to comment on it. The two big problems with this kit are that the fins and the third bridge are terribly oversized. This tends to make the entire kit look bad. Also, the price may tend to keep most of us from every buying it.

Well, that's about it for the Yamatos. Now, as a side trip, I'd like to talk about the 1600 yen Andromeda. This kit, amazingly enough, is in scale (1/700) with the 1500 and 2000 yen Yamatos. It has a nice fit, good detail and (gee whiz!) the engine and wave motion guns light up. Although this kit is hard to find, it can be well worth the time and effort to find and build. Now for the big question - "Where do you buy these things?"

Okay. There are four places I know of at present—if you know of any others please let us know. The first is Cosmic Connection. They have a pretty good selection of Yamato kits, with a smattering of kits from other shows. Their service is excellent, and if I were you, I'd keep an eye on them—they promise to be a major source of kits. The next place is Forbidden Planet Bookstore in New York. At this time, they are out of Yamato kits, but if they get new stock, their prices are hard to beat! The third place to contact is Mike Evans. Mike has not only Yamato kits, but a good selection of other Japanimation kits as well. The fourth place to contact is John Green. John buys, sells and trades all kinds of space and SF kits—a mighty handy thing if you're low on cash but have spare kits to trade.

Now that you've got the names, here are the addresses to go with them...

Good luck in finding the kits you want, and remember - if you know of a place selling these kits that we don't know about, let us know. That way all of our readers can benefit.

Now, a brief discussion on Japanese pronunciation - the vowels are pronounced as follows; a - ah, e -ay, i - ee, o - oh, and u - ooh. Also, r and I are interchangeable and v is occasionally substituted for b. We will be bringing you more song translations as we go on, so keep an eye out for them.





## What the heck's a Roman Album?

A Voluminous Study of Yamato Books

A scant handful of articles (STARLOG, QUESTAR), a smattering of ads in trade magazines (TELEVI-SION AND RADIO AGE, VARIETY), bare acknowledgements of its existence in books documenting American T.V. programs (TELEVISION 1970-1980, TOTAL TELEVISION)... Media coverage of *Star Blazers* has been woefully small. With bits of information so few and far between, how can a fan find out more?

To date, no books on Star Blazers have been published in English. But a goldmine awaits in Japan, where a Space Battleship Yamato book or magazine can be found on just about every bookseller's shelves!

Some of these publications have slowly made their way to Japanese-American bookstores in the States, along with books on other Japanese comics and animated series. All are written in Japanese, but for those who aren't maniacal enough to try to decipher the language, the pictures are nice to ogle... For folks not familiar with Japanese books, here's an explanation of some of the main types that are available:

ROMAN ALBUMS - Printed by Tokuma Shoten, these magazine-sized softcovers contain anywhere from 80 to 200 pages apiece. Each of the 55 printed to date focus on a different animated series, and sport plenty of color photo pages and black-and-white character and mechanical designs, along with other nifty things like song lyrics and fold-out posters. Two of the latest Roman Albums, #53 and #54, are Yamato Perfect Manuals, overviews of all the Yamato series and movies. (See the review of Perfect Manual 1 in the New Products section)

MANGA - Black-and-white comics, many of which are the original comic book versions of various animated series. Most first saw print as serials in weekly manga books, then were collected into paper-back form as complete stories, usually running 150-300 pages per volume. Some comic stories take up a number of volumes, most popular stories at least 3 volumes in length and sometimes more than 20. Unlike the Roman Albums, which are a line published only by one company, manga are put out by various publishers under different titles, such as Sun Comics, Sunday Comics, Champion Comics, Jump Comics and Princess Comics.

ANIME COMICS - Softcover, and just like a comic book, but the illustrations are actual stills from animated films instead of drawings, with speech balloons superimposed. The page count numbers about 150 per volume. (Anime is the general Japanese word for animation)

There are also four main monthly animation magazines published in Japan - ANIMAGE, ANIMEDIA, MY ANIME and THE ANIME. All contain the latest animation news on series and movies, color photos on glossy stock, a monthly animation T.V. guide, and all sorts of goodies like stickers, posters and kinds of mini-Roman Albums on various shows. News on the *Final Yamato* movie, as well as articles looking back at the previous series' and movies, have been appearing each month in all the magazines since July 1982, and are likely to keep on until April or May, after the movie is released March 12.

... Y'say you local Japanese bookstore only carries magazines for housewives? Y'say that oriental food shop down the way, the one that stocks the wild kiddy manga featuring Doraemon the robot cat and some Gay Cops but absolutely nothing in the line of WWII battleships in space, only tries to sell you eels and pickled plums when you ask for Yamato? Well, there's at least one bookstore in the U.S. that both deals in animation books and has a mail-order service, not to mention the cheapest prices we've come across yet (apparently 9° for every 10 yen) -- Books Nippan, the Los Angeles outlet of Nippon Shuppan Hanbai. They offer a 15% discount on books to members of their Animation Fan Club (membership \$10 a year), and stock most of the Roman Albums still in print, as well as a wide assortment of Anime Comics, manga, the monthly magazines and other items such as calendars, posters, and stickers. Service is excellent, and delivery is by U.P.S. The address: Yuji Hiramatsu, Books Nippan, 532 West 6th Street, Los Angeles, California 90014.

Another bookstore that we had good results from, Kinokuniya Book Store in Los Angeles, has apparently been sold and its status is still unknown at press time. We'll have an update next issue.

Those are the only bookstores we know of that have mail-order service. There is a book shop in Chicago that stocks Anime Comics, manga, the monthly magazines and other odd and sundry animation books: *Japan Books and Records*, 3347 North Clark. They might be worth your while if you're in the area, and they charge 1° per yen.

And if you're after back-issues of the monthly magazines, *Melody Records* stocks some, and they also have mail-order service. You can find their address in the *Sounds of Yamato* article - this issue.

(If anyone out there knows of any good bookstores, we'd sure appreciate it if you could let us know about them, so we can include them in future issues!)

Folks who became fans after viewing *Star Blazers* missed the brunt of the books that cashed in on the first wave of the "Yamato boom" in 1977 and then quickly vanished from print. But the better-quality publications on the first series and movie have remained available through the years since. A listing follows (complete with title, publisher, number of pages, yen price and cover size):

KEIBUNSHA DAIHYAKU #31 Space Battleship Yamato (Keibunsha, 320 pgs., 650 yen, 10.5 x 15 cm.) - Written with simplified kanji (a lifesaver to dictionary jockeys!), this book is crammed full of synopses of all 26 episodes, music and lyrics to the opening and end themes, character and mechanical designs, an explanation of some of the animation techniques, and 100 pages' worth of full-color photos. One of the best books you can get for information, if you can translate a little.

PERFECT MEMOIR #4 Space Battleship Yamato (Ridosha, 210 pgs., 480 yen, 9.5x18 cm.) - Really an "all-Yamato" book, it not only has episode synopses, and black-and-white anime comics from the first series, but there are also black-and-white anime comics to Arrivederchi Yamato, 32 page full color anime comics to Yamato - The New Journey, and story synopses of both. Other features are a diagram of the chain of command, and a "Yamato Catalog" of all manner of merchandise.

CHAMPION GRAPHICS ANIME COMICS *Space Battleship Yamato* Vol. 1 & 2 (Akita Shoten, 160 pgs. apiece, 750 yen apiece, 13 x 18 cm.) - Full color throughout, this 2-volume set has simplified kanji and covers the movie condensation of the first series. It's the next best thing to having a copy of the movie! SUNDAY COMICS *Space Battleship Yamato* Vol. 1-3 (Akita Shoten, 242, 216, and 188 pgs., 350 yen apiece, 11 x 17 cm.) - The original manga version by Reiji Matsumoto, and written with simplified kanji. Vol. 1 is something resembling the first series, and Vol. 2 and 3 are an as-yet uncompleted mixture of *Arrivederchi* and *Yamato* 2. Vol. 3 also has an original Matsumoto story that takes place during Yamato's voyage to Iscandar, dealing with Desslar/Desslok, his daughter Jura, and her mother Mera. SUN COMICS *Space Battleship Yamato* Vol. 1-3 (Asahi Sonorama, 208, 204, 218 pgs., 350 yen apiece, 11.5 x 17.5 cm.) - The weird ones! Keisuke Fujikawa, one of the screenplay writers for the first series, crossed *his* ideas for things that should've happened, with Akira Hio's art. In this version we get Okita / Avatar dying before reaching Iscandar, Domeru / Lysis in sunglasses, Gamilon assassins with nasty (throwable) knitting needles aboard Yamato, a Real Naked Woman... all this, and Captain Harlock too! Kanji is simplified to help wade through the strange events, too...

SONORAMA COLLECTION Space Battleship Yamato Vol. 1-3 (Asahi Sonorama, 190 pgs. apiece, 800 yen apiece, 13.5 x 18.5 cm.) - The original novelization by Yoshinobu Nishizaki, each volume has 32 pages of full-color stills from the series, black-and-white stills scattered throughout, and fascinating details in the novelization itself. It's a tad helpful to know a little Japanese, though...!

COBALT SERIES Space Battleship Yamato (Shueisha Bunko, 200 pgs., 240 yen, 10.5 x 15 cm.) -Novelization by Ken Wakasaki, black-and-white stills throughout.

MONKEY COLLECTION Space Battleship Yamato (Shueisha Bunko, 175 pgs., 480 yen, 13 x 18.5 cm.) - A novelization with simplified kanji and black-and-white stills throughout.

WONDER CARDS Space Battleship Yamato (Asahi Sonorama, 64 cards, 720 yen, 10 x 15 cm.) - A set of 64 cards printed on glossy cardboard, beautiful stills from the first series of various characters and ships, with information printed in simplified kanji on the back.

ROMAN ALBUM #1 Space Battleship Yamato (Tokuma Shoten, 88 pgs., 480 yen, 21 x 29.5 cm.) -Roman Albums could go nowhere but up after this one, but this first attempt does have a fold-out poster of Starsha by Matsumoto, 12 pages of full-color original illustrations, character and mechanical designs, episode titles and synopses, and a report on fan reactions on Aug. 6, 1977, the day Yamato was revived in the movie condensation to start the "Yamato boom". This very first Roman Album is hard to find, but goes back into print sporadically in Japan.


ROMAN ALBUM #53 Space Battleship Yamato Perfect Manual 1 (Tokuma Shoten, 212 pgs., 1200 yen, 21 x 29.5 cm.) - The opposite end of the Roman Album spectrum - gorgeous color and neverbefore-seen character and mechanical designs! Even though it shares the Manual's pages with Arrivederchi and Yamato 2, the portion devoted to the first series and movie has more photos and information then the entire first Roman Album!

Perhaps the ultimate Yamato books - certainly the most elusive - are the 3-book *Space Battleship Yamato Complete Literary Collection*, a silver-hued set that lists at a hefty 30,000 yen. Apparently published by Academy, the books contain the complete visual story, T.V. scenarios, and blueprints and data on the first series. Generalized editions were also released, with the visual story book costing 4500 yen, 1300 yen for the scenario book, and 2000 yen for the technical infor book. No copies of any of the editions are known to be in the U.S., although some collectors have been trying for years to order them.

(We're working on this ourselves - we'll let you know what we discover, Ed.)

## New Products

## Space Cruiser Yamato Theme Song BGM ¥ 1800 Tokuma, 1978 FL 1010-2 (Flexi-discs)


A two record set, this is perhaps the strangest Yamato Soundtrack ever produced! The records, which are about the size of a 45, are produced on very thin vinyl - thin for a Japanese record that is. They're about the thickness between a "soundsheet" and a typical American record.

Most of the music is available on other records, but Side 4 contains some music not found on the other soundtracks ("Jordie Venture's Theme" for one). This also has some nice versions of various songs, and the ever-popular karaoke version of *The Rival*. Karaoke is the same instrumental as the "sung" version, but with the singing cut out.

Just a note of warning here, this may be hard to find.

This set contains music from the first series of Yamato, and the movie Arrivederchi Yamato.

Record contains double-fold cover with full color pictures from *Arrivederchi Yamato* inside and out. Also an 8 page black and white booklet with plot synopses, words and sheet music, production and cast lists and episode titles for Yamato 1; 1-26 and Yamato 2, 1-10.



## Roman Album Excellent #53 ¥ 1200 Space Cruiser Yamato Perfect Manual 1

As most of you know by now, it's the 10th anniversary of the series Space Cruiser Yamato, as well as being the year the movie Final Yamato arrives. To prepare for the new movie, and to celebrate the 10th anniversary, many new books are coming out.

The first book to hit the stores is from the ever-proficient Roman Album folks and it's the best thing, in my opinion, that they're ever done! 81/4 x113/4 in size, 212 pages with cover, this is a very large, thick Roman Album. Since (hopefully) by now, you've read Ardith Carlton's article on Roman Albums, you know what a normal one is like - so I'll detail the special qualities of this one.

This book is actually three Roman Albums rolled into one, with each set of photo stories and character/mechanic sheets being tied together.

Part one deals with the first Yamato series, with most of the episodes getting at least one page, some getting two or three. Also included are the alternate end shots from the first Yamato movie and one page of the opening and closing credits for the original series. These credits are quite different from those seen in *Star Blazers!* The page count for the 26 episode guide is 32 full color pages.

Then we get to the mechanic and character drawings - including prototype drawings that were never used. 48 pages at the start of this section are character drawings and almost all major characters are covered. This section then goes into a story synopsis, with drawings for people and stuff that appear in that particular episode.

Since there's almost nothing available on the first series anymore, this part alone should be worth the money - especially if you're an artist in need of models! But wait, there's more!

The next part deals with *Arrivederchi Yamato - Combatants of Love*, and breaks the story of this very emotional movie into 32 pages with 774 seperate stills. Then we come to the character/mechanic sheets, and here's a treat. Not only are there drawings of stuff shown in the movie, but there's also unused pre-production sketches and storyboards! All this in 24 pages.

And now, Yamato 2...

Again, formatted like Yamato 1, with 16 color pages breaking down the story, plus opening and ending titles. Then there's a plot breakdown with character/mechanic stuff underneath. The problem with this section is that the drawings are so small, they generally aren't much use. Also, the drawings are jumbled together in no particular order.

After all this, there's the Character Catalog, a collection of everyone who shows up in the series as a whole. *Everybody!* Anyone who was shown, or had a speaking part, or was even just talked about, from the ship's cook to the never-really-seen "other" girls on the Yamato. From Desslok, to the lowest Gamilon staff advisor. All in color! 32 pages!


Finally, there is a 5 page discussion with Yoshinobu Nishizaki, producer of the series, telling about the history of Yamato, and what the future holds.


You may have noticed that I've made no mention of any plans or drawings of the Yamato itself. That's because there really aren't any! Some perspective views, but nothing good, clear or accurate. However, this should be cleared up by this next part.

The name Perfect Manual 1 implies a followup, and there is one. It's titled Space Cruiser Yamato Perfect Manual 2, Roman Album –54 and it should be available by the time you read this.

Perfect Manual 2 will cover the T.V. feature Yamato - The New Journey, 1980's movie Be Forever Yamato and 1981's Yamato III. Cost is 1300 yen and a much larger mechanic section is promised, hopefully with a good, accurate plan and section of the Yamato.


To wrap up this review, I feel that *Perfect Manual 1*, even though all written material is in Japanese, is an important and vital part of any *Star Blazers* fan's collection. Roman Albums for Arrivederchi and Yamato 2 have better character/mechanic sections, but the color sections of the Perfect Manual have a very high quality of selection of type and number of pictures. Remember, the pictures are in English. If you can only afford one or two books in your *Star Blazers* library, *Perfect Manual 1* and, based on this, *Perfect Manual 2*, should be the ones to buy.











